- we are clear about the measures that need to be in place to create safer environments within schools

We acknowledge that coronavirus remains in the community, but we are committed to implementing the following measures, in order to reduce the risk of transmission.

There will be labelled signs and cones for children to line up at. As soon as your child has gone to their cone we ask that you vacate the playground as soon as possible, leaving via the Effra Road gate. It is expected that Year 5 and Year 6 children will not need to be accompanied into the school grounds by an adult. Parents must not congregate around the Faraday Road Gate and must leave as soon as they have dropped their child off. Pick-up will be different for different year groups. It is very important that families vacate the What is the pick-up procedure and end times of premises as soon as they have collected their child/children, unless they are waiting for a child the school day? in Year 2 or 3, when they will be asked to wait in the designated waiting area. Parents collecting children from Reception/Year I/Year 2/Year3 should enter the playground via the Faraday Gate, and exit via the Effra Gate. Our current one-way system will continue. Parents collecting children in Years 4/5/6 should enter via the main school gate (on Effra Road), and follow the one-way system in place. Parents should not enter via the car park gate, as we need to adhere strictly to the one-way system to ensure social distancing. They must then self-isolate for children in the 'bubble' has 10 days, and their household for 14 days. We will ask you to get your child (and household) symptoms of COVID19? tested. Schools are going to be given a small number of tests to hand out as required. If the test is positive then it is likely that the rest of the children in the bubble, and the staff, will have to self-isolate for 14 days. The Headteacher will seek guidance from The London Coronavirus Response Cell if the school has any positive cases. The health protection team will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who has been in close contact with the person during the period they were infectious, and ensure they are asked to self-isolate. The health protection team will provide definitive advice on who must be sent home.

Household members of contacts who are sent home do not also need to self-isolate, unless the contact starts to display symptoms. Further information is available in the Government's stay at home guidance. If the test is negative, and providing the child is well, and doesn't still display symptoms, they may return to school. Other members of their household can also stop self-isolating. If a child becomes unwell at school their temperature will be taken (by our new infra-red thermometer) and if it is 37.8° or above, and/or your child has a new persistent cough, we will ask you to come and collect your child as soon as possible. School Streets Update

As you are aware Holy Trinity has been selected to be part of the School Street scheme. WE have been informed by Merton that this won't be starting at the beginning of term. When we have more information we will let you know. In the meantime, may I encourage you to walk/scoot or cycle to school anyway.

Please read below for further information about this scheme.

School streets is a pioneering scheme to transform roads outside schools, so that only pedestrians and cyclists can use them at school start and finish times.

The scheme tackles congestion and improves air quality at the school gates, making it easier and safer to walk and cycle/scoot to school.

How it works

From the Autumn term (date TBC), Effra and Faraday Roads will temporarily become **pedestrian and cycles only** at set times in the morning and afternoon. Vehicles will not be permitted to enter these roads between these times unless they have been granted an exemption.

You can register for an exemption if you're a resident living or working in a school street zone, a business in a school street zone, or a blue badge holder.

Signs will inform drivers of the restrictions before the entrance to the closed streets. Non-registered vehicles entering the street during the times of operation will be identified by camera and issued a fixed penalty notice.

Once the project starts, parents/carers will not be permitted to drive down or park in Effra or Faraday Roads between the periods of Monday-Friday 8.15-9.15am and 3- 4pm, term time. If you do so you will run the risk of a Penalty Charge Notice fine.
